Supporting Information

1. Background

- 1.1 A request from the Greenham Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) for a 20mph speed limit zone on Queens Road and its adjoining roads was considered by the Speed Limit Task Group, at its meeting in May 2009. The Task Group, which consists of Council officers, Members and the Police agreed to the introduction of a 20mph zone and for it to include Boundary Road.
- 1.2 Queens Road and its adjacent roads are narrow with on street parking. Some lengths of the roads do not have footways. Queens Road is tended to be used as a through route from the A339 to Hambridge Road and the A4. Traffic calming measures in the form of speed cushions are installed on Queens Road. From its junction with Northway, Queens Road becomes One-Way for eastbound traffic.
- 1.3 The statutory consultation and advertisement of the 20mph speed limit zone was undertaken between 15th July and 5th August 2010.

2. Responses to statutory consultation

- 2.1 At the end of the statutory consultation period only one response had been received. This was from a married couple from Stanley Road. Their objections were:
 - 1. That speeds are already low and if a 20 limit was introduced the road humps should be removed as they cause discomfort when driving.
 - 2. The no right turn restriction from Livingstone Road into Queens Road should be removed. This restriction was introduced to prevent drivers taking a short cut however it is inconvenient for local residents and means they have to travel a longer distance over congested and speed calmed roads.
- 2.2 For an area to have a speed limit zone it is necessary for there to be physical measures to ensure that the speed limit is self enforcing and to comply with current regulations. Therefore removing the speed cushions is not appropriate.
- 2.3 The removal of the no right turn restriction is not an objection in relation to the advertised speed limit order. Whilst the restriction may inconvenience some local residents it is considered necessary to prevent through traffic.

3. Conclusion

- 3.1 Concerns about road safety have been raised by local residents through the Greenham Neighbourhood Action Group.
- 3.2 The response received during the statutory consultation is more about removing the existing traffic calming features rather than an objection to the introduction of a lower speed limit. The removal of the no right turn restriction is not an objection that needs to be considered in relation to the advertised speed limit order
- 3.3 The Speed Limit Task Group considers a number of factors when considering a speed limit. These include the current speed limit, the injury accident record, results of any traffic surveys, the character and nature of the road. Given that the Task Group consider that a 20mph speed limit zone is appropriate it is recommended that the zone is introduced.

4. Recommendations

- 4.1 In view of the above it is recommended that the proposed 20mph speed limit zone be introduced as advertised.
- 4.2 That the respondents to the statutory consultation be informed accordingly.
