The variation seeks to make several amendments to the Premises Licence as detailed below.

#### 1) Sale of alcohol - Friday and Saturday

The application seeks to extend the terminal hour for sale of alcohol by retail on Fridays and Saturdays from 23.00 to 00.00 with the premises closing to the public 30 minutes thereafter.

#### 2) Late Night Refreshment - Friday and Saturday

The application seeks to extend the terminal hour for the provision of late night refreshment on Fridays and Saturdays from 23.30 to 00.00.

#### 3) Sale of alcohol - Sunday

The application seeks to advance the commencement hour for sale of alcohol by retail on Sundays to from 12.00 to 11.00.

#### 4) Sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises

The application seeks to permit the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises in line with the current and proposed hours for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises, namely:

- Monday to Thursday 11:00-23.00;
- Friday and Saturday 11.00-00.00; and
- Sunday 11.00-22.30.

#### 5) External areas

The application seeks to license the external areas for sale by retail of alcohol and late night refreshment only.



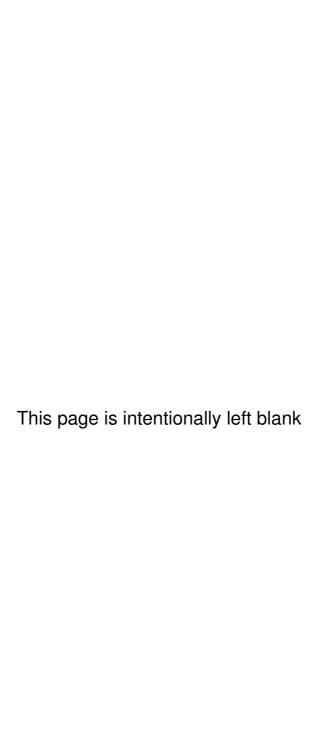

- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

- 1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on—
- (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
- (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

2.

The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

3.

The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

#### (from 1<sup>st</sup> October 2010)

4.

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

The responsible person shall ensure that-

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
- (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

### Application to extend the opening hours of The Bull Public House, Streatley

We wish to object in the strongest possible terms to the application by Marstons plc to extend the opening hours of The Bull Public House, Streatley. Our objection is based largely on the grounds of child protection, disorder and nuisance.

The Bull Public House ("The Bull") is situated in a quiet residential area in an historic village within a Conservation area and an area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. In addition, there are dwellings all around its perimeter.

Historically, The Bull has had the character of a 'country pub' and living within such proximity to it, we do of course realise that from time to time we should expect noise as people come and go. However, since the pub re-opened, under new ownership there has been a marked increase in the disturbance.

The new management seem intent on broadening the customer base away from the local community by offering cheap food and drink and the noise disturbance at the weekends in particular has increased significantly. The beer garden and associated smoking shelter have been improved and are being used more extensively and we and our children are now exposed to shouting and foul language. At certain times it can be intimidating for anyone (including children and the elderly) to walk past the beer garden and terrace on the adjacent footpath on the B4009.

There is often anti-social shouting in the evenings (particularly at weekends) and slamming of car doors late at night which disturbs us, our children and our neighbours.

The present licence until 11.00pm and 10.30pm on Sundays with the additional drinking up time frequently results in noise until midnight. Our concern is that the extended hours will attract an increasing number of late-night drinkers and we would be exposed to even greater levels of noise and anti-social behaviour into the early hours of the morning. We feel this is not appropriate, or acceptable, within such a residential area and we would appeal to you to reject the application.

We wish to object in the strongest terms to the application by Marstons plc to extend the opening hours of The Bull Public House, Streatley. Our objection is based primarily on the grounds of noise, public disorder and general nuisance.

The Bull Public House is situated in a quiet, family orientated, residential area in an historic village within a Conservation area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. All around The Bull there are private houses, many with young children.

The Bull has had a long history of being a quiet 'country pub' primarily serving the needs of local people. The new management, however, seem intent on broadening the customer base away from the local community by offering cheap food and drink together with an enlarged outside beer garden. This has already resulted in increased noise disturbance with shouting and car doors slamming particular at weekends after closing time.

The beer garden is open to the car park and road so customers are able to stay past the drinking up time and closing of the pub itself. We are writing to you in respect of the above application as we consider this would impact on ourselves as residents of Streatley and on Streatley as a village. For the following reasons we would raise our objections to the applications.

Streatley is a historic village in a Conservation Area and an area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The Bull Public House is also a historic place, designed to be a village pub which has been enjoyed by the villagers and tourists alike. However, under the recent new ownership, there has been considerable work carried out to increase the capacity of 'drinking' area outside to what is now termed a 'beer garden'. #### Re: Objection to The Bull at Streatley pub's application for an alcohol license extension

I would like to make a formal objection to the application, made by The Bull pub, Streatley, to extend the times that they are licensed to sell alcohol. This letter illustrates the reasons for my objection.

To provide the necessary context to my objection, the following paragraphs and photos below outline our property's location in relation to the The Bull pub in Streatley.

We own and reside in a detached property right next to the entrance to the Bull pub car park, and share a fenced border on the Eastern perimeter.

Due to our proximity to the pub (see photos below), we can currently hear pub customers in the beer garden on busy evenings from inside our property, particularly in the main upstairs bedroom and downstairs lounge. The beer garden has recently been improved making it more attractive & popular with customers.

As you might expect, the noise levels from the pub grounds generally increase as people leave the premises via the pub car park, which is the only exit for those customers leaving by car or other vehicle, and is also a main route for customers walking to other properties in Streatley.

The vehicle related noise levels are significantly increased in duration and level by the traffic lights (see photo below), which the majority of customers need to negotiate when leaving the car park (right turn onto crossroads providing access to 3 possible routes). There is only enough space for one car to pull out from the car park onto the road and wait at the traffic lights. This can sometimes cause a queue of traffic waiting, with engines running, to exit the car park, which lines up along the eastern border of our property (see photo), increasing late night noise levels.

It is common at the moment for people to talk loudly outside our property and the car park entrance as they are leaving the pub after closing time, e.g. to finish conversations, saying goodbye to each

other, etc. The timing and level of associated noise at the moment is at the limits of acceptability, and on occasion has woken our 4 year old son, causing him to be startled and upset (see photo below illustrating proximity of car park entrance to our property)

My objection mainly relates to the licensing objective, Prevention of Public Nuisance, based on the following concerns:

- The proposed license extension is very likely to result in increased noise, later at night, to antisocial/unacceptable levels, specifically due to:
  - People leaving the pub by car, shutting car doors and having to wait/queue with engines running to exit the car park & negotiate the traffic lights
  - Groups of people leaving the pub on foot and stopping at the car park entrance and outside our house to finish conversations and say goodbye to each other, as they disperse and go their separate ways
  - o Customers drinking in the pub beer garden later at night
- Extended licensing hours is likely to attract additional custom from surrounding villages and towns, which will increase the number of customers arriving by vehicle, therefore further increasing the late night vehicle related noise outlined in the point above

While our main objections clearly relate to the above licensing objective, we also believe the proposed extension will result in an increased risk of antisocial behaviour associated with later and longer drinking. This concern relates to the licensing objective – Prevention of Crime & Disorder.




Fig 2. Illustrating size of pub car park




Fig 3. Illustrating position of traffic lights





Fig 4. Illustrating proximity of beer garden to our property

We have learned that The Bull Pub has applied to increase its opening hours. We object to the application and ask you to refuse the license changes for the following reasons.

The Bull is an historic listed building, in a rural area, AONB, and conservation area

## Prevention of public nuisance

Our property is the closest to the front entrance of The Bull. As we live immediately opposite these premises and our bedrooms are adjacent to the pavement, the increased noise in the early hours will impact particularly on our sleep, health and wellbeing. At closing time in the past, and recently under the new management we have been awakened by intoxicated groups of people talking and skylarking under our bedroom windows. We object to being awakened at 11.45 pm and even more to the probable awakening at a later time of 00.45am. We are both pensioners with a number of serious health issues. As our property is also listed we do not have double glazing or the sound insulation associated with modern properties.

#### Prevention of crime and disorder

Streatley is a rural village with a large elderly population who do not frequent licensed premises in the hours proposed in the application. There are also a number of families with young children. It follows that the landlord is trying to attract a different clientele, from outside the village, and to promote late night drinking. This will also raise issues about drink driving, and an increase in associated crime, car theft, house breaking and the like in a community that is sparsely policed.

#### **Public Safety**

The Bull Pub is situated on the main highway between Oxford and Reading. Customers who are local will walk to the pub but all other users arrive by cars. To encourage longer drinking hours will mean private transport will be used. There is no availability of public transport at the times requested in this application. The road safety implications are self-evident.

#### Protection of children from harm

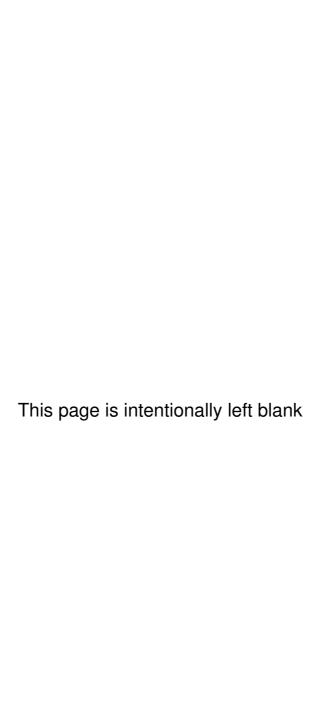

I understand that the proprietors of The Bull are in the process of applying to extend its opening hours in the evening, beyond 11pm on Fridays and Saturdays and beyond 10.30pm on Sundays.

As a young family, we are very much opposed to this course of action.

We would not welcome, in particular, the following:

- additional noise pollution in the early hours when children are sleeping;
- late night drinkers being attracted into Streatley, once all the other pubs in Goring/other villages have closed (or even those making a special journey to Streatley);
- possible increase in crime in the area due to the increase in footfall in the early hours and especially in view of the extreme difficulties in obtaining a taxi in our area and the absence of public transport.

The Bull has over recent years failed to attract sufficient customers in the evening and I understand that this is still the case, despite renovations. In my experience, the pub is almost empty by 10pm!

I cannot see why an extension in drinking hours is needed for a customer base that does not exist in the locality! It can only be to increase profits for the brewery by attracting late night drinkers from outside the area, which is not something that is beneficial for a very quiet village with low crime rates, no public transport or available taxis! Drinking until 11pm and 10.30pm should be sufficient.



I wish to object most strongly to the proposal from The Bull Inn at Streatley to extend their opening hours on Friday and Saturday nights. With the addition of a 30 minutes drinking up time this will mean in practice, activity will continue to nearly 1am on these nights.

The Bull is situated in a totally residential area. It has since 1965 when I moved into the Goring Gap, managed to run its business in co-operation with the wishes of the village population.

I write to you with reference to the application by Marstons Brewery for both extended licensing hours and permission for off license sales.

Firstly I would like to ask for an extension of the objection period. This notice has gone up at a time when a lot of people are away on their summer holidays, more so this year because of the Olympics. In addition, whilst there is a notice on the front porch entrance to the pub, the notice to the rear of the property is hard to find, even when searching for it. This further reduces the amount of people who are aware of the application.

Whilst I appreciate the endeavours of the landlords to further increase their business, I am objecting to the applications, that is for extended hours, garden sales of alcohol and off license sales.

Streatley is a quiet community in a residential rural village and this character should be retained or regulated to remain so. The demographic is not one that would require late night opening and from a safety point of view, the position of the pub on a dangerous corner is not one that is suited to late night opening.

Streatley does not have the infrastructure to support late night opening. The bus services do not run late at night and the train station (Goring & Streatley) is a 20 minute walk away. I am sure that residents of both Streatley and Goring High Streets would accept disturbances caused by late night revellers. Realistically, anyone leaving the pub at 12.30pm (latest time) would most likely be driving, which raises a question of possible drink driving, or taking a taxi (there is no taxi rank locally), which would in turn lead to unacceptable traffic late at night in a residential area. The way in which my house is positioned means that bedrooms face directly on to the car park of The Bull with obvious consequences and noise and light pollution issues. I have 3 children.

In addition there is no police station in Streatley. The nearest 24 hour police station is in Reading, meaning that any drunken or rowdy behaviour that is usually associated with late opening hours, cannot be dealt with speedily. I have been told there have previously been considerable problems associated with The Miller of Mansfield pub, during previous tenancies, as kids hung around drunk and bored in the area around the pub.

Recent conjecture in the newspapers identifies that residents, police and even customers have regretted the extension in licensing hours and opportunities for sales of alcohol that were approved in the last decade. Binge drinking appears to have become one of the scourges of comtemporary British society.

As permission is being sought for sales of alcohol in the garden, there is a strong possibility that the Landlords are hoping to be able to hold events in the pub garden. Again this would cause unacceptable noise and light pollution in what is a quiet residential area. I would encourage you to come and visit the site to see how close so much housing is to the pub garden and car park.

Lastly I believe that off license sales would encourage a crowd in search of more drink late at night to congregate around The Bull. Again causing problems of noise, light and additionally, rubbish pollution. There is already a shop in Goring which sells off license alcohol until 10pm which must be adequate for a fairly small community?

Late night opening hours and off license sales are associated with urban culture which this area is not and it is why most of us have chosen to live here.

As a resident of Streatley, I wish to object to the proposed application that Marston Brewery has made to West Berkshire Council to extend the opening hours at The Bull Pub in Streatley.

The Bull Pub is situated in the centre of Streatley. It is in the heart of a conservation area and is surrounded by many listed buildings.

Its customers are predominantly families and retired people that live in the village, who frequent the pub at lunch time or early evenings.

In the twelve years I have lived in the village I have regularly noted the pub to be empty most evenings by 10.30, including on a Friday and Saturday night. I have also known for the pub to close due to lack of custom, especially in winter months.

I therefore do not understand why the pub needs to extend its opening hours.

Historically the pub has supported its community. It has been a venue for local group meetings and Streatley School fundraising evenings to be held. Previous land lords have allowed children to stand on its front away from the traffic, whilst waiting for the bus to take them to The Downs School.

An extension to The Bull Pub's opening hours will significantly change the ethos of a quiet village pub.

By permitting a change to extend the opening hours on a Friday and Saturday at The Bull Pub, you increase the problems related to being able to drink for longer. These include higher levels of noise for local residents as people leave the pub later at night, and a greater risk of damage to property or theft due to drunken behaviour.

I am concerned that an extension to the opening hours will deter many locals from using the pub as people from further afield will come in to the village attracted to the fact that they can drink for longer.

The increase in cars on a Friday and Saturday night will add to the noise and disturb residents living in close proximity to the pub. There is also a chance that people could risk drink driving on country lanes and even bring drugs in to the community.

The village needs to continue to enjoy a pub that meets the needs of its community. This being a focal point for friends, neighbours and relatives to meet at, where good drink and food is served.

The new management team and the brewery must take in to consideration what is best for the community it is part of, and must not be driven by greed; otherwise they are in danger of losing the village support they currently enjoy.

I trust that my comments are noted along with the views of other residents of Streatley when considering whether to grant a change to the licence at The Bull Pub.

l am writing to you to make a representation in respect of the above application made by Marston's plc. The application, as I understand it has 5 separate points, I wish to state my objection to Point 1 - To extend the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol on Fridays and Saturdays from 23:00 to 00:00 and Point 5 - To extend the terminal hour for the provision of late night refreshment on Fridays and Saturdays from 23.30 to 00.00.

My property immediately adjoins that of The Bull public house with the rear of my house less than 15 metres from the car park and beer garden. Our 3 bedrooms are located at the rear of the house and are occupied by ourselves and our 2 young children. I am concerned that noise from the now extensive beer garden will extend later into the evening and so will the noise of people saying their farewells, of car doors slamming and engines revving as the patrons leave the premises, well after midnight.

The pub is nestled into a residential area, which wasn't the case when it was built, when it was surrounded by commercial premises and fields. In the past 40 years all of those businesses have gone and the premises and fields have all been converted to housing. Opening hours that might be considered appropriate for a pub located in a town centre commercial district, or on a roadside in the countryside, are not appropriate in this situation.

I am happy with Point 4 of the application, to allow the consumption of alcohol within the garden boundary, but only in respect of the existing opening hours. I have no representation to make with regard to the other points in the application.



We wish to object very strongly to the above application for extended opening hours at The Bull pub. Not only will this potentially cause excessive noise and disturbance for the residents who livé in close proximity to the pub, but we feel it will permanently change the rural nature of our village. The Bull is located in the centre of a rural village (in an AONB) and not in a town centre where there are many other pubs and clubs with late licences. The proposed changes, in particular opening late and selling alcohol and food from the garden which will be visible from the road and neighbouring gardens could have a detrimental impact on the nature of the village.

We have other concerns as well – many of the people frequenting the pub are from outside the village - the car park there is already virtually at capacity. Must we have yet more traffic coming through the village? There is no overflow car park available for increased numbers and therefore any cars are likely to be parked in neighbouring roads. While this could happen now at least the cars are likely to go before midnight and any noise associated with their occupants before then as well. This will not be the case if the hours are extended.

If the opening hours are extended so potentially will the alcohol consumption. There is no bus service in the evenings and on Sundays and no regular taxi service either.

We are delighted to see that The Bull is thriving under new management but feel that extending the opening hours and serving food and drink in the garden is not appropriate for the situation of this historic pub, or compatible with the village as a whole.

I am writing with regards to the planning application by The Bull pub in Streatley, West Berkshire. I would like to object to the proposed longer opening hours on the following grounds;

- 1. No local demand. The pub is situated in a small village in an area of outstanding natural beauty, where I believe there is no local demand for this service. The area is made up of peaceful and natural surroundings, and the population of Streatley live here because of this. With Lardon Chase, The Holies and the new Streatley Meadows, we look to encourage visitors who appreciate the local nature such as families, ramblers and outdoor enthusiasts, and not late night drinkers. In essence I do not believe there is local demand for this. And do not wish the nature of our small country village to become changed by inviting outsiders with different interests to come drinking alcohol late in the evening and early morning. I also believe there would be a risk that our natural surroundings would be damaged by litter and noise late at night early in the morning.
- 2. Noise disturbance. I believe that with the large pub garden being situated at the bottom of a small valley, longer opening hours would create a severe noise disturbance late at night to those in our village and in particular to those living in neighbouring family homes and to residents of the Coombe. This would be from drinkers, music and possibly even tv screens.
- 3. Drink Drivers. There are no local taxi firms or public transport. I believe that by opening for longer hours there would be a huge risk of drink drivers leaving the pub to travel home. The Bull crossroads is already a significantly risky junction for pedestrians and drivers alike, as shown by the number of times there has been accidental damage to both the Bull pub building and the neighbouring property across. This risk would become greater with extended drinking hours.
- 4. Litter. With more alcohol being consumed, there will inevitably be more litter being strewn around the area as drinkers leave the pub to either drive or walk home. For example broken glass bottles and crisp packets. It is our young

families with young children and babies who are up early in the morning and out walking and cycling, who would be confronted with this risk.

It is my understanding that there have been various confusing official and non official notices put up, but no other local consultation has been considered. Indeed notices have been put up when many residents are away on holidays. The team at The Bull pub and the brewery have done a very good communication job of selling their existing service with a one and a half page spread in the latest edition of our local freely circulated magazine, the Goring Gap News. Yet they have made no mention of their plans to extend opening hours, which suggests they have not taken into consideration good consultation within Streatley. Furthermore it is my understanding that there may not be in place a licence to sell food and drink to be consumed in the garden at the moment, which I imagine should be the priority, and not applying for extended hours. As far as I am aware, the act of offering legislation for extended drinking hours

was not put in place for small village pubs in local communities.
