### **Supporting Information**

#### 1. Background

- 1.1 Since December 2008 Community Led Plans (or Parish Plans) have been formally endorsed by West Berkshire Council, via the Individual Decision process.
- 1.2 The endorsement of a Parish Plan means that the Council commits to working positively with the community to realise the vision set out in the plan. This means that the Council will give approval or sanction, where it can, actions that have the support of the community and have been included in the Parish Plan Action Plan. This is subject to the draft Action Plan having been circulated to the Council and its Partners by prior agreement and the actions discussed in consultation with the Principal Policy Officer for Community Planning.

#### **Community Planning In West Berkshire**

- 1.3 West Berkshire Council, working alongside other key partners such as the Community Council for Berkshire, the West Berkshire Partnership and the local community, has promoted the development of Community Planning across the District.
- 1.4 The Council's success in pushing forward this work has been recognised nationally; firstly through the award of Beacon Status for the local authority in 2006 as part of the "Empowering Communities Improving Rural Services" theme and subsequently through the successful joint local authorities bid to the national Beacon Peer mentoring fund, which the Council led, to further develop work in Community Planning.
- 1.5 Parish Plans are key documents that set out a vision for how a community wishes to develop in the future. They contain an action plan that will help to realise that vision. The original Lambourn Parish Plan was completed in 2005 this refreshed document now sets out the revised priorities for this community.
- 1.6 Parish Plans are developed through a wide ranging consultation process with the local community. This helps ensure that the resulting plan reflects the needs and aspirations of local people. The Plans are therefore an important source of intelligence about the views and concerns of the community as well as highlighting specific actions that communities wish to see taken in their areas. This information plays an important part in shaping both service planning and delivery across the Council but is increasingly being used to inform Council strategy and policy development.
- 1.7 The process by which Parish Plans are developed involves extensive liaison and engagement with service providers and statutory organisations, most especially the Council. This close involvement and dialogue helps ensure that officers are aware of the direction and aspirations of the community and can help develop meaningful and realistic actions.
- 1.8 This close engagement between the Council and the community at a very practical level helps to provide an excellent platform for improving relationships and communications between the local authority and the communities it serves.

- 1.9 A further benefit emerging from Community Planning is that it has helped bring communities and organisations together to focus on developing solutions to local problems, for example; joint working on environmental issues, such as noise from the M4; allotment provision; growing food locally and development of local business groups.
- 1.10 The attached refreshed Lambourn Parish Plan sets out the Parish aspirations and Action Plan for this community.
- 1.11 The action plan is built around the 5 themes of the sustainable community strategy. This provides an ideal focus for the plan and helps develop clear links between local activities and the overall strategic vision for the district.

#### 2. Equalities Impact Assessment Outcomes

2.1 The refresh process involved wide scale consultation including 1,500 questionnaires sent to each household in the Parish. This survey work was critical in ensuring all groups had the opportunity to express their views and ensured the Plan reflected the wants and needs of parishioners.

#### 3. Recommendations

3.1 It is RECOMMENDED that the Plan be formally adopted by the Council as an important document.

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#### Lambourn Parish Plan Refresh

#### Introduction

A Parish Plan refresh is a vision of how the community would like its town or village to be. For many communities, it's also the foundation for other applications for funding or local action. It aims to help rural communities to have a greater say in their own affairs. It is an opportunity for the people living in the community to set down their vision for the future of their town or village.

A Parish Plan Refresh can cover everything that is relevant to the people who live and work in the parish, from social housing to places for children to play. It should address the needs of the entire community, including local businesses. Everyone should have an opportunity to contribute to its preparation.

Fundamentally it is about proactively managing change in a planned manner. The Parish Plan Refresh sets a direction and creates targets for actions to achieve the desired outcomes.

### The approach to writing the Lambourn Parish Plan Refresh

The Lambourn Parish Council agreed to create a Parish Plan some years ago. The Parish Plan Refresh is an updated version of the existing Parish Plan which was written in October 2005. Public consultation is considered key in the development of a Parish Plan Refresh. This plan has been based on a large number of inputs from the community which have been collected through surveys, individual discussions and by seeking the input of organisations and groups in the parish who in turn represent many of the key stakeholders in the parish plan.

Whilst some plans focus on recording detailed statistics about the parish and its residents, often to a very detailed level, it was felt that the Lambourn Parish Plan Refresh should focus more on where the parish would like to be in five to ten years time. Thus much of the effort of research and opinion seeking has been focused on the desires and ambitions of the residents rather than the detailed recording of the attributes of the parish as it is today.

The plan is an expression of what is important to the residents of the parish, what is valued both physically and socially and how the parish should develop in the future in order to preserve and enhance these features. The plan is by its very nature a living document and will be updated over time as significant changes in attitudes or desires of the residents of the parish are noted.

It is anticipated that the Parish Council will establish a number of working groups to address the items in the action plan and thus be able to draw upon the experience and expertise of non-elected individuals.

## Communication of progress

The Parish Plan Refresh and the action plan will naturally continue to evolve. Regular updates will be available to the residents of the parish through a number of different means:

- Open meetings (Annual Forum) of the Parish Council
- Parish Council meeting minutes available from the Council or from <u>www.lambourn.info</u>
- Parish Plan pages on www.lambourn.info
- Specific updates posted in local newsletters such as Village Views
- Printed copies of the Parish Plan which will be available from the Lambourn Library, the Council offices and the Lambourn Centre

## **Background to Parish Plan Refresh**

The original Parish Plan was published in 2005. To ensure that the Plan continues to reflect the parishioner's wishes, a Refresh process was started in 2010. This involved a Parish Consultation and various meetings to decide on the required questions for the questionnaire.

Over 1500 questionnaires were sent out either by post or hand delivered to each house in the Parish.

We received 452 responses. These were in the form of the completed questionnaires returned to the Parish office or completed on-line.

We would like to thank Greenham Common Trust for all the assistance in both the printing of the questionnaire, the creation of the on-line questionnaire and the compiling of the responses.

#### The Achievements from the 2005 Parish Plan

The following actions were achieved:

- Installation of CCTV cameras in Lambourn was completed in 2008.
- Refurbishment of Eastbury Play Area was completed in December 2007.
- A Website has been created which hosts the Lambourn Parish Information and meeting minutes.
- A 'What's Happening?' diary has been included on the website.
- A notice board was installed in Upper Lambourn.
- · Streetlighting was improved and a cleaning schedule implemented
- A Disaster Management plan was created and is in place.
- Additional facilities were provided at the Old Cricket Field Skate Park (i.e. Youth Shelter and Ball Wall)

#### The Action Plan

The Action Plan was created from the responses received under pre-defined headings.

- The Lambourn Parish Council will continue to work very closely with the West Berkshire Council, the Police and traffic wardens to ensure a safer community.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will create an information brochure, assist in the creation of a history museum to celebrate the horse racing industry and is committed to upgrading the local broadband
- The Lambourn Parish Council will actively work toward creating Open Spaces that encourage parishioners to use them more.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will work with West Berkshire Council to re-instate the byways and to maintain them in a state that they can be used as cycle/pushchair paths.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will work with the District Council and Local Dog Warden to reduce the litter and dog fouling incidents within the Parish.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will work with West Berkshire to encourage longer Library opening hours.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will set up a Youth Club to provide an alcohol-free, drug-free safe environment for the local teenagers to meet at.
- The Lambourn Parish Council will support the creation of day trips for the elderly.

## **A Safer Community**

#### **Speeding**

Speeding traffic is a major concern within the Village with a 56% response to prove it. Parishioners want drivers to stay below the speed limits throughout the Parish. The Police are targeting specific areas of concern to compile statistics to prove whether this is a major problem and if so, try to reduce the risk of injury/accidents.

## Parking illegally on the pavements on the High Street, Newbury Street and Oxford Street

Parking on the pavements causes obstruction to drivers and pedestrians alike. The Parish Council are working in conjunction with the Civil Enforcement Officer and West Berkshire Council to try to reduce this risk.

#### Parking illegally on double yellow lines on the High Street

Parking on the double yellow lines causes major obstruction down the High Street of Lambourn. This issue is being tackled by the Lambourn Parish Council and the West Berkshire Council in an attempt to reduce the incidence of this major risk.

#### **Poor Road Condition**

Poor road conditions cause a hazard to all road users (in this case drivers, pedestrians and horses). The Parish Council will continue to work closely with the West Berkshire Council to identify the hazards and get them repaired in a timely fashion.

#### **Uneven Pavements**

Uneven pavements cause a trip hazard to the young and elderly within the parish.

The Parish Council will continue to work closely with the West Berkshire Council to identify the hazards and get them repaired in a timely fashion.

We would like to encourage all parishioners to report unsatisfactory pavement conditions to Customer Services at West Berkshire Council via email - <a href="mailto:Streetcare@westberks.gov.uk">Streetcare@westberks.gov.uk</a> or by phone on 01635 519080.

#### Improved Horse Signage

75% of the respondents requested additional horse signage for within the Parish to warn all drivers of the risk of injury to all road users (drivers, pedestrians and horses) in the event of unsafe driving practises within the Parish.

Most Parishioners are proud of the local link to the horseracing industry and would like this information to be more broadly recognised.

## **A Prosperous Community**

#### **Information Brochure**

During the survey it became clear that most parishioners were unaware of all that the Local Parish has to offer, thus the Lambourn Parish Council will endeavour to create an information brochure which lists all the activities which take place on a weekly, monthly or annual basis within the Parish.

#### Creating a racing museum

53% of the respondents would like to see the creation of a racing museum to celebrate the local link to the horseracing industry. Most would also like to find out more about the winners which have successfully been training within our parish.

#### **Broadband**

The Lambourn Parish Council has committed over £22 000 to the improvement of the local internet facilities to improve the broadband speed and connectivity within the Parish. This is in conjunction with West Berkshire Council and the relevant Broadband suppliers. 71 % of the respondents agree that this is a priority within the Parish.

## A Healthy Community

#### Cycle Paths/Pushchair paths between Eastbury and Lambourn

Of all the local paths linking the various villages of the Parish, the Lambourn to Eastbury footpath was recognised as the one requiring the most attention as there are no pavements within the Eastbury village and the link would allow for a safe connection between the 2 villages.

Lambourn Parish Council will endeavour to create this link to allow for the safe access between villages and encourage a healthier lifestyle of cycling or simply taking walks within this area of outstanding natural beauty.

#### Benches/picnic tables at Old Cricket Field

A large percentage of the parishioners within Lambourn are dog walkers and often make use of the Old Cricket Field. Thus it was felt that additional picnic table or benches would encourage a longer visit to this particular Open Space within the Parish. 54% of respondents requested additional benches so they could enjoy spending time at the Old Cricket Field.

#### Benches/picnic tables at Mill Lane

The Mill Lane play area is a children's play area which encourages outdoor activities. It was felt that additional picnic table would encourage entire families to use the facility more and encourage a healthier lifestyle. 45% of respondents felt that additional picnic benches would be useful.

#### Benches/picnic tables at Eastbury

The Eastbury play area is a children's play area which encourages outdoor activities. It was felt that additional picnic table would encourage entire families to use the facility more and encourage healthier life style. Although only receiving a 27 % response this was requested by all Parishioners who completed the questionnaire living in Eastbury.

## **A Greener Community**

#### **Anti-litter**

Lambourn Parish Council will continue to work closely with the District Council to ensure that the local area is litter free.

We will also continue to encourage working parties to ensure the River Lambourn is kept litter free.

### **Dog Fouling**

Additional Dog bins have been provided in the Parish to allow dog walkers to pick up after their dogs. These have been placed in Greenways and Walkers Lane.

Dog Fouling is a particularly anti social behaviour which needs to be addressed with the threat of fines and action being taken by the Dog Warden.

Not only is this unpleasant but it could potentially be a health risk.

Lambourn Parish Council will continue to work closely with West Berkshire and the local Dog Warden.

## **A Stronger Community**

#### **Creation of Social Club for Teens**

Although only 28% of respondents requested this facility, we must bear in mind that the average age of the respondents were over 40 with only 17% of respondents being under that age (4% of respondents did not include their age).

After the completion of the questionnaire it was brought to our attention that 2 of the 3 local Youth Clubs within Lambourn have been closed.

With the withdrawing of funding from West Berkshire and the lack of volunteers to continue running the second Youth Club, this is causing major concern within the Parish.

The youth need a safe place to meet to foster a sense of belonging and participation in community life. This will also encourage friendship and teamwork.

The Lambourn Parish Council will endeavour to set up a Youth Club to provide a safe alcohol - free and drug free environment. It will encourage the advancement of human rights, conflict resolution and reconciliation, as well as promoting religious and racial harmony, equality and diversity.

The Sub-committee will be fund-raising to cover the cost of the venue, the social workers and any other costs which may be incurred.

It will also encourage the advancement of amateur sport.

## Creation of day trips for the Elderly

The Lambourn Parish Council will support the creation of day trips for the elderly. We currently advertise any event in our notice board. 52% of respondents requested additional theatre trips or days out. We will encourage the creation of additional trips and assist where possible.

64% of respondents were over the age of 50 and would appreciate the additional facilities.

### **Supporting Information**

#### 1. Background

- 1.1 Since December 2008 Community Led Plans (or Parish Plans) have been formally endorsed by West Berkshire Council, via the Individual Decision process.
- 1.2 The endorsement of a Parish Plan means that the Council commits to working positively with the community to realise the vision set out in the plan. This means that the Council will give approval or sanction, where it can, actions that have the support of the community and have been included in the Parish Plan Action Plan. This is subject to the draft Action Plan having been circulated to the Council and its Partners by prior agreement and the actions discussed in consultation with the Principal Policy Officer for Community Planning.

#### **Community Planning In West Berkshire**

- 1.3 West Berkshire Council, working alongside other key partners such as the Community Council for Berkshire and the local community, has promoted the development of Community Planning across the District.
- 1.4 The Council's success in pushing forward this work has been recognised nationally; firstly through the award of Beacon Status for the local authority in 2006 as part of the "Empowering Communities Improving Rural Services" theme and subsequently through the successful joint local authorities bid to the national Beacon Peer mentoring fund, which the Council led, to further develop work in Community Planning.
- 1.5 Parish Plans are key documents that set out a vision for how a community wishes to develop in the future. They contain an action plan that will help to realise that vision. The original Burghfield Parish Plan was completed in 2003 this refreshed document now sets out the revised priorities for this community.
- 1.6 Parish Plans are developed through a wide ranging consultation process with the local community. This helps ensure that the resulting plan reflects the needs and aspirations of local people. The Plans are therefore an important source of intelligence about the views and concerns of the community as well as highlighting specific actions that communities wish to see taken in their areas. This information plays an important part in shaping both service planning and delivery across the Council but is increasingly being used to inform Council strategy and policy development.
- 1.7 The process by which Parish Plans are developed involves extensive liaison and engagement with service providers and statutory organisations, most especially the Council. This close involvement and dialogue helps ensure that officers are aware of the direction and aspirations of the community and can help develop meaningful and realistic actions.
- 1.8 This close engagement between the Council and the community at a very practical level helps to provide an excellent platform for improving relationships and communications between the local authority and the communities it serves.

- 1.9 A further benefit emerging from Community Planning is that it has helped bring communities and organisations together to focus on developing solutions to local problems, for example; joint working on environmental issues, such as noise from the M4; allotment provision; growing food locally and development of local business groups.
- 1.10 The attached refreshed Burghfield Parish Plan sets out the Parish aspirations and Action Plan for this community.
- 1.11 The action plan is built around the 5 themes of the sustainable community strategy. This provides an ideal focus for the plan and helps develop clear links between local activities and the overall strategic vision for the district.

#### 2. Equalities Impact Assessment Outcomes

2.1 The refresh process has aimed to reach as many of the community as possible to encourage wide feedback on the issues raised within the questionnaire. The Action Plan will continue to identify the wide range of groups within the community, and will work with these in partnership for the benefit of all.

#### 3. Recommendations

3.1 It is RECOMMENDED that the Plan be formally adopted by the Council as an important document.

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## **Background**

The Parish Plan is about helping local communities to help themselves by showing how they can participate in influencing the way issues are addressed locally.

This Burghfield Parish Plan is about protecting all that is good in Burghfield Parish and ensuring that future developments are in harmony with the character of the surrounding Parish as well as being in accordance with Parish needs.

Parish Plans are about giving local people a say in the future of their community. In order to do this the Parish Council must first analyse the distinctive character of their village, understand the needs and demands of the community and then draw up a set of actions to maintain or address the priority issues. The Parish Plan should represent the views of the parish as a whole and where appropriate must be compatible with the statutory processes and the local context.

This Plan was prepared by Burghfield Parish Council. The main source of information used in the preparation of the Parish Refresh Action Plan was the results of the questionnaires sent to residents, local businesses and voluntary groups.

The Parish Council would like to thank all residents and organisations who were involved in and participated in the extensive work required in completing the Refresh process.

## **Refresh Objectives**

This Refresh 2012 of the Parish Plan presents the communities vision for the Parish and provides the framework in which the community and the Parish Council will use in shaping development over the next 5 years.

#### **Parish Plan Refresh Process**

A Parish Planis a living document with a requirement for communities to revisit and refresh every 5 years. The purpose of this process is to update the Action Plans following extensive consultation with their communities. This ensures that the documents are relevant and up to date to meet changing populations and emerging topics of interest.

The Parish Council initiated in November 2011 the Refresh process with a questionnaire being delivered to all households within Burghfield. This proved very successful with a total of 38% questionnaires completed and returned. They highlighted the concerns, opinions and views of residents for the future of the village.

These views were analysed and have provided the basis of the Refresh Action Plan. The Parish Council included questions to assist with resolving ongoing issues and to develop enhanced communication with local parishioners.

2,500 questionnaires were delivered to every property within the Parish during November 2011. Residents were asked to post them back using the prepaid envelopes, or complete online using their unique reference number. Two drop-in sessions were held at the village hall to offer assistance to anyone requiring help in completing the questionnaire. Local businesses were also sent questionnaires specifically designed with business requirements in mind; however, the response rate was very disappointing at just 1%.

The number of completed responses received was 900, with over 40% of those respondents being over the age of 60. The results reflect the views of 36% of total households and 15% of the population of Burghfield Parish.

Parish Councillors attended the May Fayre to encourage local residents to get involved in the implementation of the Parish Plan as well as leaflets being distributed to the 2,000 people who attended the Diamond Jubilee "Royal Rec" party organised by the Parish Council in conjunction with other local groups.


A public event was held at Burghfield Village Hall on 1<sup>st</sup> July 2012 to present the initial findings from the questionnaire to local residents and obtain further input and comments from a wider cross-section of the community as possible.

#### The Parish Plan Refresh Action Plan

The process of Parish Planning has developed extensively since the Council published its first Parish Plan in 2003. Establishing best practice from the experience of many differing communities, West Berks Council have developed a template for communities to use when formulating their individual Parish Plans.

The underlying requirement for communities, in accordance with the objectives set by West Berks Council, is to consider the needs and aspirations under the following five key Sustainable Community strategy themes:

- A Stronger Community actions in this category should seek to include everyone, fostering a sense of belonging and participation in community life, providing similar life opportunities and accessible services for all.
- A Greener Community this will include reduction of the community carbon footprint, reducing waste and increasing recycling, encouraging consumption of local produce and increasing the diversity of local wildlife.
- A Safer Community examples of this include reducing anti-social behavior, reducing speed on roads and planning for emergencies.
- A Prosperous Community supporting the economy of the village and rural employment, and encouraging tourism.
- A Healthy Community communities have been asked to think widely about health, including such issues as fostering a sense of place and belonging, improving the health and well-being of local people, including young people, and promoting the independence of those residents who are vulnerable.

The following paragraphs, using the above headings, show the aspirations of the parishioners of Burghfield Parish with the resultant future vision, objectives and actions. This is followed by the consolidated Action Plan.



## A New Vision for Burghfield Parish

### **Stronger Community**

#### Questionnaire results and commentary

- 1. **Printed newsletters** Residents were asked how they found information relating to the parish and local community events. It was evident from the replies that effective communication is seen as essential if we are to build a stronger community. 88% of respondents expressed a preference for printed publications as a way for Burghfield Parish Council to communicate with residents more effectively.
- 2. **Re-design of parish council website** Residents were asked how Burghfield Parish Council could better communicate with residents. 40% of responses indicated that more information via the Parish Council web site was desired with an auto email alert system for news, new information or parish events.
- 3. **Conservation of the surrounding countryside** 72% of respondents expressed the preservation of the countryside within Burghfield as an important aspect, contributing towards the overall well-being of the community.
- 4. **Maintaining a quiet environment** Respondents expressed an overwhelming desire to maintain and conserve the peaceful rural environment. Supporting its nature, with access to the countryside, country walks and other rural characteristics of Burghfield.
- 5. **Open spaceswithin Burghfield Parish** The conservation and enhancement of the open spaces within the parish are important to parishioners. Environmental management and conservation activities will help to maintain this valued asset and its biodiversity.

#### Vision for the future

- Support and encourage the production of printed newsletters
- Promote effective electronic communication with parishioners
- Enhance environmental management and conservation within Burghfield Parish



#### **Key actions:**

- **Printed Newsletter** Closer local links with both businesses and schools to provide a printed newsletter for publication and circulation to Burghfield Parishioners.
- Re-designparish website Implement changes to existing website to incorporate enhanced features such as email alert groups, parish documents and news, parish events and links to other Burghfield organisations.
- Conservation of the surrounding countryside —Identify priority areas and routes within Burghfield Parish for maintenance and enhancement. Working in conjunction with West Berkshire Council and professional organisations.
- Maintaining a quiet environment Make the relevant authorities aware that Burghfield Parish is to remain a quiet and rural environment. Ensure this is reflected in the West Berkshire Local Plan.
- Open spaceswith Burghfield Parish Review and implement the Open spaces management plan to enhance and protect the open spaces within the parish.



## **Prosperous Community**

#### Questionnaire results and commentary

- 1. **New housing development** –90% of respondents want to see the number of new houses limited, with a clear indication that Burghfield Parish remains a place where its distinctive character is maintained. There is a strong desire to limit expansion both within and outside the settlement boundary in the parish at large.
- 2. National and Local Planning Policy compliance 80% want to see new developments in accordance with National and Local level Planning Policies. Burghfield has in recent years seen building of new houses increase and extensions to existing houses undertaken. These developments have generated considerable comment from parishioners and the parish council. Tight control of planning on an on-going basis is required to ensure planning policies are enforced, particularly in respect of site over-development.
- 3. **Parish led documents** 73% believe that new developments should be in accordance with the Village Design Statement (adopted August 2011) which sets out the standard of house design, quality, character, style and space to complement the rural setting of Burghfield.
- 4. **Shopping facilities within Burghfield** 75% of respondentsstate that Burghfield provides adequate grocery shopping for the next 5 to 10 years, with the emphasis on smaller shops offering personalised customer service and value for money whilst maintaining accessibility as being most important.
- 5. **Local support** 70% of respondents support local retail and community services to encourage local businesses, maintain services and to retain the economic vitality of the parish.

#### Vision for the future

- Burghfield should remain a quiet, peaceful and rural parish valued for its beautiful countryside, and lack of urban noise and traffic
- To promote the local economy by supporting local businesses and service providers

**Key actions:** 



- **New housing development**—Ensuring new development strengthens the character and function of the settlements in the parish by working in conjunction with the Local Planning Authority in the preparation of the Site Allocations and Delivery DPD.
- National and local planning policy compliance To ensure future developments within the parish reflect, and are consistent with National (NPPF) and Local Planning policies (West Berkshire Local Plan).
- **Parish led documents** -Ensure that future development proposals respond to the guidelines set out in the Village Design Statement (August 2011).
- **Shopping facilities within Burghfield**—Draw up, publish and maintain a list of local businesses, e.g. information about local businesses, making available on both parish and community websites.
- Local support Support and encourage local businesses to promote the local economy.



### **Healthy Community**

#### Questionnaire results and commentary

- 1. **The Willink Leisure Centre** 59% of parishioners who responded use the Willink Leisure Centre. 30% wanted to see an improvement in the quality of the swimming facilities provided with an additional desire for a reduction in cost.
- 2. **Provision of Youth facilities**—42% of respondents cited that one of the areas requiring improvement within the parish was the provision of additional youth activities. 60% of respondents also expressed that teenagers hanging around on the streets was a problem within the parish.
- 3. **Provision of Play Areas**–75% of residents who responded advised they used the play areas provided by the parish council. The provision of such areas is an integral and important aspect of family life and general well-being for the children of Burghfield Parish.

#### Vision for the future

- To attain a friendly, well managed and vibrant Leisure Centre at the heart of a strong and healthy community.
- Promote a shared vision for how all parts of society including councils, schools, charities, businesses – can work together in partnership to improve facilities and activities for young people
- To ensure that Burghfield Parish has a variety of high-quality places for all children to play safely.

### **Key actions:**

- The Willink Leisure Centre Promote, support and encourage the development of Leisure Facilities to ensure the well-being of parishioners
- Provision of Youth facilities To expand the provision for the youth of Burghfield Parish by
  instigating a youth led, all-inclusive activities program for the next and future generation.
  By putting into place the framework that will enable Burghfield Parish Youth to develop
  their own activities with the support of the Parish Council
- **Provision of Play Areas** To maintain the high quality play areas and facilities provided, identifying the importance of natural play for children within the parish



## **Greener Community**

#### Questionnaire results and commentary

- 1. **Energy saving & conservation** -79% would like to see an increase in the use of alternative, sustainable energy sources being promoted in both existing and future housing developments to encourage a reduction in the carbon footprint within Burghfield Parish (Policies CS14 and CS15). 65% of respondents did not favour the use of wind turbines.
- 2. **Energy provision** 80% of respondents expressed a desire for the introduction of solar powered street lighting as an energy saving option. However, 62% of residents said they would be happy for street lights to be switched off between 12am and 5am.
- 3. **Improved transport integration** 86% of respondents would like to see better integration between the train and bus service. Frequency of service, and a desire for a reduction in fares featuring as the main areas for further investigation.

#### Vision for the future

- For Burghfield to become a greener and more sustainable parish
- Ensure that public transport integration and services are improved for the benefit of parishioners

### **Key actions:**

- Energy saving & conservation Encourage the local Planning Authority to develop and enhance the provision of energy saving measures in existing and future housing developments within Burghfield Parish
- Energy provision To reduce the carbon footprint by encouraging a reduction in energy consumption, the promotion of renewable energy and an increase in energy saving measures within Burghfield Parish
- Improved transport integration—To investigate and identify potential improvements for the integration of local transport services



## **Safer Community**

### Questionnaire results and commentary

- 1. **Improvement in general highway repairs** 58% of residents would like to see improvements in the on-goingmaintenance of roads and pavements within the parish by the local highway authority.
- 2. **Road safety improvements**–66% of respondents identified specific "danger spots" within the parish. An area of major concern amongst residents is the speed of traffic along both Reading Road and Clayhill Road, as well as the parking of vehicles outside local schools.
- 3. **Increased visibility and police presence** 50% of local residents would like to see an increase in police visibility and perceived presence within the parish, to increase public reassurance and reduce the fear of crime.
- 4. Increased facilities for the youth to reduce anti-social behavior—54% of respondents considered anti-social behaviour as a minor problem within the parish. A request for additional youth activities within the parish was requested to ensure the issue does not escalate.

- For Burghfield to become a safer place for all to live, work and enjoy
- Promote road safety within Burghfield Parish and encourage drivers to drive responsibly
- In partnership with the Local Police Authority, build a safer and more confident community to retain and protect the wellbeing of Burghfield parishioners

### **Parish Plan Refresh Monitoring**

Once the Parish Plan Refresh document has been adopted by the Parish Council, the actions identified within it need constant monitoring to check on progress. Review of the Parish Plan will be a regular ongoing process to ensure the actions can be achieved.

The Parish Action Plan will become a regular item on the Parish Council Agenda to ensure it stays fresh in people's minds; keeping people alert to what is happening and be useful in resolving any blockages or problems that may occur along the way, such as:

- **Dormant action or barriers** There could be many reasons why a particular action is not going anywhere. The Parish Council should be able to find a way around any barriers. For example, if partner agencies are needed to help with a project, the Parish Council may be best placed to make contact with them and invite their participation.
- **Problems stopping progress** If there is a blockage in achieving the action then this should be discussed with the Parish Council to determine a suitable resolution to the problem.

### How often should the Plan be reviewed?

The plan can be reviewed at any time, but as a minimum, it should be reviewed on an annual basis. This will help to address any changes that may have occurred within the community, or any changes that need to take place in the action plan so that the Plan continues to be a representative and viable document. For example:

- **Themes** Has anything changed significantly within any of the themes within the plan, and if so is further consultation with the wider community necessary as a result
- Local changes Have new opportunities opened up within the community that could affect
  any proposed actions, or have any problems arisen preventing some actions being
  completed
- **Demographics** Has there been a significant shift in the demographics of the community that will impact on any part of the plan and if so how should this be addressed
- Identify changes Has there been any major change to the infrastructure of the area, such as new roads, or impact flooding, and what can be done within the confines of the Parish Plan to address these things
- Is the plan still relevant Has all the work been done, or has none of the work been done?
- What hasn't worked or happened Are there things that haven't happened due to lack of funding, or because there is a particular problem stopping progress



## **Parish Plan Refresh Implementation**

The Parish Council, who will monitor implementation of the Parish Action Plan, will undertake the following steps;

- Restructure the Parish Council's Committee structure in line with the Action Plan to ensure timely, efficient delivery
- Key individuals and organisations will be approached, as necessary to ensure full implementation of key actions identified
- Liaison with existing groups will continue with enhanced communication being a key action
- Where identified, Partnerships will be formed to ensure progression of key actions and implementation of the future vision for Burghfield
- Continue to provide quality services to parishioners and where identified make improvements
