## **Supporting Information**

## 1. Background

- 1.1 West Berkshire Council's Home to School Transport Policy sets out the circumstances in which it will provide free transport to children and young people travelling to school or college. It therefore relates to West Berkshire residents of statutory school age (from the term following 5<sup>th</sup> birthday to the end of Year 11).
- 1. 2 West Berkshire Council's post-16 Transport Statement sets out how the Council will meet the requirements of the statutory guidance for post-16 pupils.
- 1.3 Local Authorities are required by law to provide help for some pupils but may also provide help for others on a discretionary basis, such as through the Farepayer Scheme.
- 1.4 The Council reviews its Home to School Transport Policy, post-16 Transport Statement and Farepayer Scheme annually and is required to consult on proposed changes.
- 1.5 The consultation includes:
  - Home to School Transport Policy 2015/16
  - Post 16 Transport Statement 2015/16
  - Farepayer Scheme 2015/16
- 1.6 The changes are outlined in section 2 below.

#### 2. Transport Consultation 2015/16

2.1 The consultation was available on the West Berkshire Council website between 27<sup>th</sup> June and 8<sup>th</sup> August 2014. It was also highlighted to statutory school age parents through the school's newsletter and text systems. Post-16 parents who already use the fare payer scheme were advised by letter. Respondents were asked for their views on the following proposed changes:

#### Home to School Transport Policy 2015/2016

- The definition of an available route (previously known as a safe route) has been refined to provide clarity.
- Special Educational Needs pupils in a mainstream school the policy has been extended to clarify that low income families qualify in certain circumstances
- Reference to the School Transport Behaviour Code has been included
- Discretionary entitlement for post-16 students to places on the school bus, at a discretionary rate has been included
- Low income families can pay for 6<sup>th</sup> form transport in instalments.
- Exceptional circumstances has been extended to include 6<sup>th</sup> form students
- Discretionary entitlement is now subject to re-assessment for each academic year.
- Revised appeals process, matching national guidance
- Clarity regarding transport complaints
- Clarity re transport consultation

#### Discretionary Fare Payer Scheme 2015/2016

- This scheme now guaranteed for 6<sup>th</sup> form students on existing bus routes, as per the Home to School transport policy
- The prices have been updated
- The date for the opening of the application window has been updated.
- The methodology for allocating places has been altered, in response to feedback from parents.
- Non-West Berkshire residents can access spare places left after West Berkshire residents allocations

### Post-16 Transport Statement 2015/2016

- The Statement has been re-drafted following the publication of revised statutory guidance in February 2014.
- The statement includes information on exceptional circumstances, feedback, complaints and consultation.
- The Statement should be read in conjunction with the updated:
  - o Travel Guide for 16-19 year old students
  - Home to Schools Transport Policy
  - o Behaviour Code

#### Travel Guide for 16-19 year old students

- Re: 16-19 Bursary scheme the Guide will be updated in Summer 2014 and will include commentary from each school and College about the use of the bursary and whether students can apply for support with transport.
- 2.2 During the consultation phase the government issued revised Statutory Guidance (July 2014). This was reviewed in detail, and as a result for clarity, a) the wording under Qualifying School now includes reference to the Education Health and Care Plan and b) more detail was included to expand the explanation about the Appeal Stage. The policy was fully complaint with the new Statutory Guidance.

#### 3. Responses

- 3.1 There were 9 respondents who logged into the online consultation. However, none of the respondents chose to comment on the proposals.
- 3.2 One paper based response was received in support of the introduction of a subsidised rate for sixth form students.
- 3.3 Councillor Allen responded and welcomed the changes and amendments that had been made. He proposed that the eligibility for paying by instalments be extended to all families who receive working tax credit. This change was agreed.

## 4. Equalities Impact Assessment Outcomes

4.1 There is no decision to be made and therefore no Equality Impact Assessment has been undertaken (EIA stage 1 completed below).

#### 5. Conclusion

5.1 It is recommended that the proposed changes are implemented and the Home to School Transport Policy, Fare Payer Scheme, Post-16 Transport Statement and 16-19 Travel Guide are agreed for 2015/16, subject to the minor amendments noted in 2.2 and 3.3. above.
