Group Affected	What might be the effect?	Information to support this
Age	The current scheme is targeted towards children in general and towards elderly residents in residential and nursing homes. These are particularly vulnerable groups of individuals with regards to oral health. The removal of the scheme will therefore impact on these groups. However, given that existing projects can deliver some of the outcomes of the service and the training and knowledge gained from the service in recent years, it is likely that the impact will be minimal. Disability	At present, the scheme specifically includes oral health training of staff who work in special schools. These are vulnerable groups of individuals, particularly with regards to oral health with more children attending special support schools having visible plaque when compared to children in mainstream schools. Removal of this service potentially risks increasing these inequalities. However, the staff within these schools and care homes have already received this training and can continue to implement this within their day to day practice without the need for ongoing training. Gender Reassignment	The current service is aimed at children in generally, specifically 0-5 years old and those attending residential, nursing homes or special schools. Therefore the impact on this particular group should be neutral.	
Marriage and civil partnership	The current service is aimed at children in general, specifically 0-5 years old and those attending residential, nursing homes or special schools. Therefore the impact on this particular group should be neutral.	
Pregnancy and	The current service is aimed at children in	

maternity	general, specifically 0-5 years old and those attending residential, nursing homes or special schools. Therefore the impact on this particular group should be neutral.	
Race, Religion or Belief	The oral health promotion service is to be decommissioned. The overall impact of this is expected to be minimal and there is no evidence that any individual of a particular race, religion or belief will be particularly impacted by the discontinuation of this service.	
Sex and Sexual orientation	The current service is aimed at children in general, specifically 0-5 years old and those attending residential, nursing homes or special schools. Therefore the impact on this particular group should be neutral.	

### **Further Comments relating to the item:**

The proposal is for the Oral Health Promotion service to be decommissioned. Although the service will no longer be present, it is believed that existing projects can deliver some of the outcomes of the service, for example through the Children's Centres and Health visitors. In addition, knowledge gained through delivery of the service in previous years can ensure the key health messages are still delivered.
