The event is bigger than it used to be when it first started a few years ago and has also become louder, with live and recorded music being played for long and continuous periods.

Evidence for grounds for review:

- 1. A resident of Bewicks Reach discovered an individual urinating next to the communal bin rooms at around 5.30 p.m. on 11. September. When confronted, the individual claimed to have attended the beer festival and been desperate for the toilet.
- 3. I checked noise levels using the NIOSH app on an ipad from the boundary between my property at RG14 and the Northcroft Lane West car park at RG14 1BN on the day of the event. Typical levels were around 60-80 dB but sometimes higher and for long continuous periods between the early afternoon and 10.00 p.m. I refer to NIOSH guidelines advising ear defenders be provided to workers at 85 dB, with assessment at 80 dB and I suggest that continuous noise levels as recorded can thus be considered to constitute a potential risk to the hearing of residents. Furthermore, levels must have been higher within the park area and thus constitute an even greater risk to the hearing of those closer to the source. Even if attendees may be deemed to have willingly accepted the risk of hearing damage, those not attending the even certainly have not. I note that the area is close to multiple residential properties. In addition to the potential damage to hearing, continuous noise levels of this type are disruptive to the lives of residents during the event and interfere with residents' rights to enjoy their properties.
- 4. Children also attend the event, and I would submit that the excess alcohol consumption of some attendees, along with language used, is inappropriate for children. Attendees leaving the event could be heard shouting aggressively and sometimes using inappropriate language in earshot of my own children (ages 7 &9) in their own living room. In addition, my children were unable to sleep until after the event finished at 10.00 p.m. which I think is unacceptably late for children of this age.

This event has caused excess noise and disruption in previous years, and I contacted the organisers by email on Friday 10 Sept asking when music would be expected to cease. I received a response that same day informing me that the last song was expected to finish at 9.30 p.m. with everyone to have left site by 10.30. However, music did not in fact finish until 10.00 p.m. I did receive an apology by email on Sunday morning.

I have previously registered concerns about this event and do not believe that live music, especially at this volume, is acceptable in a residential area. I also do not think it is acceptable for large numbers of people to be inebriated in a residential area.

I attach previous email correspondence from 2018 between then Councillor James Fredrickson and myself and refer you to the request he subsequently made to Mark Edwards, Head of Highways at West Berks Council, for footfall management to be reviewed. This seems not to have happened.

I believe Northcroft Park is no longer a suitable venue for an event, which although billed as a family event is in fact clearly an event dedicated to consumption, often in excess, of alcohol.

For the above reasons, I appeal against this licence.
