1 Purpose of the Report

This report presents the revised SEND and Inclusion Strategy 2024-29. It is accompanied by a detailed Delivery plan addressing the priorities contained in the strategy.

4 Executive Summary

- 4.1 A SEND and Inclusion strategy is a requirement for local authorities to set out how they will discharge their legal responsibilities in relation to the provision of care and support for children and young people with SEND and their families.
- 4.2 This strategy has been coproduced in line with SEND Code of Practice and is ambitious for children and young people in West Berkshire.
- 4.3 The strategy is accompanied by a Delivery Plan that incorporates all elements of innovation in SEND for West Berkshire's children incorporating the transformation activity required through the Delivering Better Value in SEND programme.

5 Supporting Information

Introduction

5.1 The timing of this revised strategy incorporates the schedule of work agreed with the DfE as part of the Delivering Better Value (DBV) programme. (This programme was

agreed with the DfE (March 2024) after the first draft version of the strategy was presented.)

Background

- 5.2 There is a strong and clear vision for SEND services in West Berkshire: Children with SEND receive the right support, adjustments, and interventions, at the right time, to thrive in childhood and to prepare for adulthood.
- 5.3 It is a requirement for local authorities to set out how they will discharge their legal responsibilities in relation to the provision of care and support for children and young people with SEND and their families.

Proposals

- 5.4 The Strategy (Appendix A) sets out six (6) key priorities.
 - Early Years
 - Early Intervention
 - Inclusion
 - Developing local specialist provision and support
 - Strengthening Alternative Provision
 - Preparation for Adulthood
- 5.5 Each priority has between four (4) and five (5) goals.
- 5.6 There is a clear delivery plan (Appendix B) which contains the details of the arrangements. This plan will be regularly monitored and formally reviewed and updated annually to ensure that the strategy remains agile and is able to reflect changing needs and demands in a fluctuating area of service delivery.

6 Other options considered.

6.1 Doing nothing (i.e. not having a strategy) was rejected as it is a statutory requirement.

7 Conclusion

Approval of the SEND and Inclusion Strategy 2024-29 will ensure the local authority discharges its statutory responsibilities. It will provide a strategic framework for the delivery and continued improvement of services to children and young people with SEND and their families.
